Insurance?

Have you ever wondered what would happen if you asked your Insurance Company to cover you in the event of a nuclear accident? They wouldn't do it, not at any price. And although you may think you're safe living in Vancouver, a supposedly nuclear-free city, what about the nuclear-capable warships that sail into our harbour? Or what if fall-out from an accident somewhere else is carried here? Your insurance company won't help you, and no level of government guarantees full or even partial compensation to victims of a nuclear disaster.

The Federal Government does, however, protect the nuclear industry itself. The Nuclear Liability Act gives manufacturers of nuclear products 100% protection from any liability resulting from an accident caused by their products. The government also put a cap on the liability of utilities running nuclear plants. So while the nuclear industry is protected from bankruptcy the people of Canada have virtually no guaranteed protection at all.

Energy Probe in Toronto is preparing to go to court in order to have the Nuclear Liability Act struck down. If this action succeeds, Canadians would at least have financial recourse in event of a nuclear disaster, as industries could be legally responsible. More importantly, the nuclear industry would be more inclined not only to tighten safety measures, but also to use alternative technologies for producing electricity since a nuclear accident could mean financial ruin. 




