- a) Program Coordination
- Carry out planning and deliverables as per project funding agreements.
- Develop and maintain project workplans, budgets, and timelines.
- Participate in team meetings as required.
- b) Grant writing
- Coordinate the preparation of grant applications and reporting with SPEC as required.
- c) Stakeholder Engagement
- Interview and survey farmers to determine key areas of interest related to ecosystems services, climate adaptation, and farm management.
- Plan and deliver workshops and other events.
- Deliver a public outreach campaign about ecosystem services.
- d) Research and content development:
- Support the development of extension materials.
- e) Site visits
- Deliver on-farm activities (for example, soil sampling, planting pollinator habitat, etc), as required.
- Provide additional onsite support to farmers as reasonably required.

- f) Evaluation
- Gather and track project data and prepare annual summary reports.
- Support the recruitment and onboarding of new program staff (as required).

Recommended qualifications

- Background or knowledge/experience in sustainable food systems, soil science, environmental stewardship, climate change, project management, event planning, community organization
- Post-secondary education in sustainable food systems, ecology, soil science or a related field
- Strong time management and organization skills, with attention to detail
- Excellent English language communication skills (oral and written)
- Excellent computer literacy and the ability to learn new platforms quickly; SPEC works in Google Suite and experience in this environment is a must; experience in Mailchimp, Wordpress, Canva, and mainstream social media platforms is an asset.

A combination of education and relevant work experience may be considered.

This position has a strong focus on computer-based tasks, and as such you will primarily work alone with support from SPEC's Food Team and administration staff as needed.

The work schedule is flexible with a monthly evening team meeting.

The position is remote and requires semi-regular travel to Vancouver. Some regional travel may be required.
